



Why we need to change what we do!

- → The youth unemployment rate in 2022 was 8.5 percent, down from 10.0 percent in 2021
- → About three-fourths of the unemployed youth in 2022 were looking for full-time work.
- → The unemployment rate for persons with a disability was about twice as high as the rate for persons without a disability.
- → 30 percent of workers with a disability were employed part time, compared with 16 percent for those with no disability.
- → Persons with a disability were less likely to have completed a bachelor's degree or higher than were those with no disability.
- → Those who had attained higher levels of education were more likely to be employed than those who had attained less education.



Capacity Building Institute format


It's just NOT a conference (sit and get and learn)



Four Team planning meetings

Use team planning meetings to:

- Work hard and have fun
- Learn from other team members and content experts
- Assess identified priority areas to achieve desired outcomes
- Discuss new content learned at workshops/sessions
- Develop 2023 strategic plan, including goals to reach outcomes
- Identify strategies to sustain the work back home



Things to think about in your team (for CBI and beyond)

- Review goals and progress with interagency team
 - Are there goals the team wants to bring forward for the 2023 plan?
 - Are there new areas the team wants to consider, based on the preassessment results?
 - Are there other initiatives currently in your state around transition? How do the identified priorities align with this work?
 - Develop process to sustain the work when you get home?





- Furthest team is Federated States of Micronesia & Northern Mariana Islands




Vocational Rehabilitation and Special Education State personnel on Team



39 States have both VR and SpEd State Personnel on Team


States with a Family Member or Parent Training & Information Center




20 States have a family member or a Parent **Training &** Information Center representative on their team
